The First Pure Thomsonites

During the past six months, Carol Gray has kept the internet lines humming in Quathiaski Cove, BC, tracking down and chatting with members of the Class of 1964 at Thomson C.I.

This "virtual reunion," we hope, will lead to an actual live get-together next year.

What is so special about the Class of 1964? By the usual measurement, those who completed Grade 13 in that year would have enrolled in Grade 9 in September, 1959, the month/year Thomson opened. Hence the appellation by which they were often called after graduation: the "first pure Thomsonites."

Previous grads would have started their high schooling elsewhere. Subsequent grads could never be "the first." Never mind the various complications: some Grade 13 grads would have moved into the area during high school; Grade 12 grads, especially in the Commercial program, would actually have left in 1963, while the "6-year students" waited until 1965. And other 1959 beginners would

have been transferred to Cedarbrae or Midland when they opened. Regardless, they are all considered Class of '64 for reunion purposes.

Profiles

To salute the 25th anniversary of the Class of '78, Bob Doi contacted the 1977-78 Grade 13 Class Reps and asked them for reminiscences and updates. Mark Parent's appeared in the the Spring issue. Rita (Flickinger) McCann's response is printed below:



Rita in 1978

Fondest Memories: High school holds memories for everyone. My problem is that there are so many that I think I have forgotten until someone mentions a name or an event; then suddenly I remember every detail.

I remember being so nervous on the first day of school in Grade 9. Everything seemed so important. To this day I even remember the outfit I wore. I remember walking to school with **Lorrie Halliday** and my friends, **Jennifer Gilbert**, **Diane Carter** and **Conchita Brown**. I remember having activity days where you could actually go on a trip to some place like the Thousand Islands boat cruise and still have it considered a school day.

I remember teacher strikes - no, they are not a new phenomenon! I also remember that I don't think I fully recovered from some. I remember house parties and a trumped-up challenge to play basketball, boys against girls. Unfortunately I had forgotten how big a basketball court can seem as you run up and down it (especially since I had dropped Phys Ed after Grade 9). I remember school plays and assemblies. I remember chocolate-covered cream-filled doughnuts from the cafeteria.

Favourite Teachers: I have a couple of teachers that I often think of when I remember my days at Thomson. **Mr. Lake**, my science teacher, was one of the first teachers that thought of us as young adults. I will never forget how he invited our class to his home for a barbecue in the middle of winter. We learned about electricity and plant growth. I remember pressing flowers, then trying to identify them, and conducting an experiment on poinsettia growth. I also remember going to a nursery near Mr. Lake's home for a field trip.

I remember **Mr. Truesdale** because he taught my favourite class, Man in Society. I took a college night school course in Sociology because I couldn't wait to learn more about it. I will never forget the day Mr. Truesdale asked what we would like to do with the time left if we had only a few weeks to live. When someone answered that they would "f*ck my brains out," I think he was a little speechless!

Education: I went to York University to pursue my interest in Sociology. I absolutely loved my "Man in Society" and "Family Studies" courses in high school. I didn't know what I could do with that interest and thought I might take English as well, and then teach the course myself in high school.

On registration day I met **Tami Brown** and **Mike McCann**, who were also attending York. We decided to carpool together from Scarborough each day.

The year I was to apply for my combined education degree, I was told that I couldn't combine Sociology and English and teach what I wanted to. Rather than argue, I thought I would just apply at the end of my degree instead, since teachers were not exactly in demand at the time. I graduated with an Honours B.A. in Sociology (and took my own minor in English).

Career: I worked part-time at "The Permanent" Trust Co. while at York and became permanent staff after graduation. I started as a teller in a branch at Woodbine and Steeles and then moved to the Term Deposits department in Head Office, downtown. When The Permanent was taken over by Canada Trust, my department was one of the few Head Office areas not cut in the merger.

In Retail Credit, I was the branch support officer for Canada. When people in the branches had systems problems, they came to me, and I investigated. I helped develop the on-line credit systems (credit applications, loans, lines of credit, etc.). My job involved travel to London, ON, to meet with the rest of Canada Trust's Head Office and the systems area.

Once I began to have my children, I again thought of a teaching career, this time in elementary school, as there now seemed to be a demand, and I wanted to have more time at home. I applied to

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
