Life After Thomson

We renew our survey of what some teachers have done since leaving Thomson.

Since **Walter (Wally) London**, Thomson's first Head of History, left to become Vice Principal at Woburn in 1963, much of his career was post-Thomson. In 1968 he moved to the Faculty of Education, University of Toronto in the Practice Teaching Department. He retired in 1985, having been Vice-Dean for the last seven years. In retirement, he and his wife spent 5-6 months each year in Florida until they sold their home there last year. For many years now their Toronto home has been down near the St. Lawrence Market, which they visit at least three times a week. They need their car only for trips out of town. A fitness buff, Wally works out every day and plays hand-ball three times a week - not bad for a 77-year-old! His favourite hobby is military history; he's an avid reader. But his family (two daughters and a son and their families) remains his number one love.

Elizabeth MacDonald (née **Bream**), another member of our original staff (English), left in 1962. She was pregnant, and in those days women in many professions had to

quit work before their pregnancy showed. She did some supply work until returning full-time at Milneford Jr. High and then Victoria Park S.S. in North York. She returned to Scarborough in 1971 as Library Head at Agincourt C.I., then in 1973 moved to L'Amoreaux C.I. as Associate Chair of Communications. After 18 years there, she completed her career at Computers in Education (Program Department), retiring in 1993.

She did a brief but exciting stint in Hong Kong (all expenses paid) teaching teachers how to integrate computers into their programs. She spent 1997 to 2000 in B.C., volunteering with seniors (teaching computer skills - what else?) in West Vancouver. She returned to Toronto to look after her mother (who died just this year) and is now back in Scarborough. She has survived two marriages and two divorces and has been **Elizabeth Bream** since 1979. She remains proud of her two tall, blonde daughters.

Robert (Bob) Williams taught French and English at Thomson from 1969 to 1978. He was then

named Head of Modern Languages at W.A. Porter C.I., where he stayed for ten years, until moving to the same position at Sir Oliver Mowat C.I., replacing the retiring **Harvey Bride**. Bob himself retired in 2000. During his career he served for five years on the provincial executive of the Ontario Modern Teachers' Association, taught immersion summer school (7 years) for the Scarborough Board in Leysin, Switzerland, and also in Nice, France (6 years) for Upper Canada College. With **Ian Fraser** from U.C.C., whom he met at the Nice sessions, he has published thirteen readers for students in grades 7 through 11. Independently, he has edited the Canadian edition of a workbook series called "Ça va?"

Now in retirement in London/Grand Bend (ON), his pace has slowed quite a bit, but still includes visits to Switzerland to visit his godson and to Rome to visit a high school chum. He remains in contact with other Thomson teachers, **Ron Allen**, **Pam Lock**, **Brenda Newell**, **Joanne McMinn**, and **Kerry Walton**.

Ron Hall (from our first Grade 13 graduating class in 1961) and his wife, Diane, rent a chalet on Salt Spring Island, a vibrant, diverse and partly mountainous area of 200 square kilometres in the Strait of Georgia, close to Victoria (B.C.). Their chalet sits atop a ridge looking south, with sweeping views over the ocean towards Vancouver Island. Tall Douglas firs cover most of the four-acre property, which is close to golf, tennis, beaches, and town. The chalet has two large decks; is newly decorated, with a full kitchen; and enjoys complete privacy and quiet. It is available year round for short- or long-term stays. Lovely scenery, walking trails and water activities abound.
