NEW SCHOOL? NOT SO FAST!

Since our last newsletter, in the spring, unexpected developments have stalled progress on plans for the new David and Mary Thomson Collegiate, so optimistically rendered in the design drawing above. The future of the present Thomson site is now up in the air following the City Council Motion to suspend all approvals as a result of the French Public School Board's withdrawal of their offer to purchase. The most likely outcome will be demolition of the building (there may yet be souvenir bricks available for alumni!) with commercial or residential development. However, since the property is presently zoned as School, consultation with the community will occur as part of the City Planning approval process.

Councillor **Michael Thompson**, anticipating and reacting to community concerns, successfully put through his motion to place a hold on all planning and construction even before the matter of rezoning had officially been introduced. This means that although the new school itself has received support and approval, nothing can be done until the fate of the rest of the property has been resolved. The Toronto District School Board are exploring ways to react to this set-back. The 2016 opening date suggested in our spring newsletter will undoubtedly be delayed by one or even two years. That will involve extra costs. And, if you have been in the "old school" recently, you will realize that, understandably, not much has been spent on repairs and upgrades, leaving the present students and staff to toil in less-than-ideal surroundings for a longer time than they had anticipated.

One aspect of the plan for the present four-school complex has been initiated. Donwood and Highbrook graduates may be interested to know that Donwood has been converted to a K-8 school from its former K-6 designation. Room for the extra students, and for full-day kindergarten, has been found by using most of the space in the Highbrook building as part of the Donwood program. Otherwise, we await developments.

NEW SCHOOL: HERITAGE PLANNING

The Toronto District School Board's administration staff have invited Thomson Alumni to be involved in planning for the old schools' (Thomson's and Bendale's) and the Thomson family's heritage to be represented in the new building. The initiative for this action was taken by alumnus **William Stratas**, who also acts as the webmaster for our alumni website. He made contact with board officials and they have responded by including alumni reps at two planning sessions earlier this year. Former teachers, **Jim Myrvold** and **Stan Farrow** joined William and Bendale's and Thomson's principals at the first, where the architect displayed plans and drawings. The second involved a visit to North Toronto Collegiate, to see how they have preserved and displayed their heritage in a new building. North Toronto, at 100 years + has a sizable heritage, but Bendale and Thomson total over 100 years as well. NTCI grads, however, already from a relatively affluent part of the city and with more time to attain influential positions in society, could underwrite costs and organize support more easily. It will be up to us to decide how ambitious we want to be and how much fund-raising we are prepared to do. William is excited at the possibility that our new school, with high, eye-catching walls by the gymnasia and the cafeteria, could handle large, imaginative digitally-produced murals at lower cost and with grander effect than traditional trophy cases, etc. provide. In 2010, following our 50th anniversary celebrations, the Thomson Alumni established an award to honour Grade 9 students who demonstrated leadership skills and who enthusiastically participated in the school community - displaying the kind of Thomson spirit we share as alumni. There is one award for boys and one for girls. We are proud to introduce the winners from last year's Grade 9 class.



Sulaman Karimi was a member of the rugby team and also made a point of participating in class and working hard at his studies. He applied too late to join the Future Aces leadership group, but intends to remedy that oversight this year, while continuing with rugby as well as the chess club. He was enrolled in the extended French program at Charles Gordon Senior Public School, so it's not surprising that he lists French among his favourite subjects. But he includes Science and Phys Ed as well. Prior to Charles Gordon, he graduated from Donwood Park. He has two older brothers, an older sister and a younger brother, with whom he enjoys playing basketball.

She had also attended a leadership conference at Pigeon Lake for the three days prior to our meeting, so she learned of her award only as she sat down to chat with us and with vice-principal **Nicholas English**, who is responsible for prizes, awards and commencement planning. Her favourite subject in Grade 9 was Geography, but that is replaced by History in Grade 10, necessitating a different choice this year - which she hasn't decided yet! She attended Lord Roberts and Charles Gordon prior to Thomson. She is the youngest of four girls in her family.

Outside of school, she has been taking piano lessons for two years, working on her Grade 3 syllabus now. THOMSON'S NEWADMINISTRATORS

David and Mary Thomson C.I. has a new principal, **Bill Papaconstantinou**. Bill is not actually new to the school, having served as Head of Boys Physical Education for eight years, when he replaced the retiring **Jim Myrvold** in 1999. Prior to that he began his teaching career at Northern Secondary School in 1991 and after seven years moved to West Toronto as Head for a couple of years before creation of the amalgamated Toronto board allowed him to move to Scarborough at Thomson. After Thomson, he served as Vice Principal at Bendale B.T.I for three years and principal at Winston Churchill C.I. for four. He jumped at the chance to apply for the opening at Thomson when **Soriana Mantini** retired, echoing her judgement that "Thomson's the best". "The staff are engaged and take responsibility for the school's success. The students are enjoying themselves here. I love this place," he says.

His background at both Bendale and Thomson puts him in a good position to handle the preparations for the new combined school. The fact that he knows many of the staff members already is another plus. He lives just north of Thomson Park; so his commute

is very short. However each morning that commute is preceded by an hour's round trip to Bill Crothers Secondary School in the Markham district, transporting the older of his two teen-aged daughters to join her fellow national-class athletes in the special sports-oriented program there. Interestingly, the architectural and contracting team that built Crothers are also responsible for the new Thomson, so Bill has had a chance to assess their work. The building atmosphere is amazing, according to Bill. All the facilities are inviting and state-of-theart, but the third-floor library, airy and inspiring, is a real winner. So he's quite eager to see what transpires in the next few years.

Alison Kelsey has also joined Thomson as a Vice Principal. Her background is in Phys Ed, the same as Bill's. In fact, she and Bill grew up across the street from each other, attending Glen Ravine, Charles Gordon and Midland Ave C.I. She would have preferred to attend Thomson, a shorter walk, but lived just south of the creek boundary. Her teaching career has taken her to William Osler, Sir Robert Borden, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, an exchange in New Zealand, back to Laurier and Borden, then to Albert Campbell and George S. Henry and Vice Principal duties at A.Y. Jackson and Cedarbrae before finally getting her wish to attend Thomson. She finds the students very polite and friendly and the staff supportive. Just what she always hoped for at the school.
