ALUMNI AWARD WINNERS

At Thomson's annual Awards Assembly, October 18, we presented plaques to this year's two winners of the Thomson Alumni Award, "awarded to one female and one male student from the grade 9 class of 2017-2018 who have distinguished themselves through leadership and participation in the school community." Here are brief profiles of the two winners.

Anam Mian's quiet demeanor masks a self-assured and talented young woman. In her first year at Thomson she served as a Grade 9 representative on the TLC (Thomson Leadership Council). That involved helping to organize a number of events, the most memorable of which (for her) was the Spirit Assembly. Academically, she maintained an above-85 average in all her subjects. When she was asked to pick a favourite subject, she selected Phys Ed, with Math and Science close behind. Sadly, she was not successful in trying out for the volleyball team last year, but intends to join the badminton team this year.

She has an older sister and brother, both of whom graduated from Thomson. She finds the school very welcoming and has very positive feelings for the school.

As for career plans, she still has a number of choices in mind: a lawyer, an accountant or a doctor. (Anam asked that we not take her photograph for this article.)



Bryan Zouhair shares a number of accomplishments with Anam. He was also a Grade 9 rep on the TLC, helping with the production of a winter concert, an ACE lunch and parent-teacher interview night. He was a member of the Future Aces program. Academically his average has remained around the 85% mark. And his favourite subjects, in order, are Math, Science and Phys Ed.

His older sister graduated from Thomson last year, and he has two younger brothers, in Grades 1 and 7. Like Anam, he and his siblings were all born in Canada, but his parents come from Lebanon and from Nigeria, probably not a common mix! He likes Thomson, finding it more diverse than many other schools he has heard of, offering more opportunities and connections.

Beyond Thomson's walls, he is involved this year in Leadership by Design, a program for African-Canadian Grade 10 students. And he certainly exhibits many of the positive traits of a future leader. As for career plans, he is very definite: he intends to enroll in the University of Toronto at Scarborough, aiming to become a neurosurgeon.



FORMER THOMSON TEACHER MAKES HEADLINES

Bob Williams, from our Modern Languages Department 1969-1978, recently became a media star. In his words: In mid-August, my 96-year-old mother received a letter from Canada Post threatening to stop mail delivery if she did not install front steps to an 8 1/4 inch rise to make the mail slot more accessible. Her 10 1/2 inch rise was

considered a safety hazard to the letter carrier. To avoid a costly repair, I purchased a large rural-style mailbox and placed it on a lower step so the carrier could avoid the "climb". But the following day the new box was disregarded and the mail was still put through the slot in the front door.

I fired off a Letter to the Editor of the London Free Press (*Bob and his mother now live in London, ON*) outlining our plight. In response the paper sent a reporter and camera man for an interview. My saga made headlines in all the Sun Media newspapers across Canada and was picked up by the CBC and local radio stations, requesting interviews. You don't mess with a 96-year-old! Two local contractors telephoned in sympathy. Within two weeks new steps and railings were installed (a \$2800 job) for free. (The squeaky wheel does get the grease.) I sent off another letter thanking all who "stepped" up to bring about a satisfactory conclusion to this episode.



In January, we lost one of the "first pure Thomsonites", **Harold Hughes**, who was a member of the Class of 1964. Many schoolmates will remember him as "the big guy who played the big tuba" in the school band. Immediately after graduation he began work as a controller for a large mechanical company, obtaining his accounting degree through five years of continuing education courses while at work. He married Carol Edward, his high school sweetheart, and they raised two daughters while moving around Canada and the United States. In 1985, Harold switched careers and joined Carol in real estate, buying and managing rental properties in Solon, Ohio. He was 72 when he died. We offer our sympathies to Carol and the family.

In July, news reports covered the fatal crash of a plane at Buttonville Airport, just north of Toronto. The pilot was Shebaz Butt, 46, a graduate of Thomson in 1991. He was an anesthesiologist at Markham-Stouffville Hospital, well known for his mountain-climbing adventures. He was two mountains shy (Mt. Everest, thwarted by an avalanche in 2014; and Mount Vincent Massif in Antarctica) of his goal to climb the highest peak in each of earth's seven continents. He used his Everest expedition to raise funds for his hospital. He avoided death on his mountain challenges by careful planning and training, and he was also an accomplished pilot, so there's no accounting... To his wife, Ramona, his four children and his colleagues, friends and family, we offer condolences.

Finally, students from the early 1970s may remember Bob Gentile, who began his teaching career at Thomson in 1970 and was a member of the English Department until 1975. They will not be surprised that his personality and talents led him into administration, from which he retired in 2002 as principal of Woburn Collegiate. One interesting bit of trivia is that he hired Brian Farrow, Stan's son, to teach Music and Phys Ed at Woburn - and Brian is still there!
